

Farmington Town News:

County Road Q Update:



Last spring we were notified that Cty Road Q would begin reconstruction after Labor Day, with September 8th as the starting date. The County Highway Dept accepted the Faulks Bros. bid to do the work. Road closures will be in place; for local traffic only. The first phase will be completed by November, with the entire road to Hwy 54 completed in spring of 2016. Thank you for your cooperation while traveling.

Tom Simpson has been busy trimming back trees in the road right-of-ways for your driving safety.

We appreciate our resident phone calls to notify us of any brush, tree or limbs that have fallen down that could affect safe driving conditions.

Winter snow removal:

The Town contract continues with Faulks Bros. Contact either Kevin Will (715-513-0013)(24/7), Caroline Murphy (715-498-9820) or Town Hall (715-258-2779) with any concerns. **Reminder:** Please do not snow blow or shovel snow into the roads. Once it becomes ice and solid, it makes it harder for the plows to clear. **THANK YOU!**

Summer road work: The Town seal coated the following seven roads: Bartel, Grenlie, Townline, Butts, Garfield, Rieben, and Smokey Valley

Seal coating was used to extend the life of a road at an economical cost. By making a timely application of a new sealcoat surface before the old one deteriorates completely, we can extend service life 7 to 10 years and maintain a good riding surface. We crack sealed fifteen roads. Thank you for your patience with the road maintenance workers.

Because of that lengthy rain downpour we had, Faulks Bros. and Town maintenance crew worked on repairing several washed out right-of-ways.

Waupaca County Recycling & Solid Waste Program Update

Whether you have roadside pickup or you take your garbage to the Waupaca Regional Recycling Center, 601 Lakeside Parkway in Waupaca, remember that recycling of certain items is required by State Law and County ordinance to reduce what is thrown away and ends up in the landfill. Recycling not only saves valuable landfill space, but also preserves natural resources, saves you money, and provides thousands of jobs in the State of Wisconsin! We need you to do your part and recycle all you can! Please refer to the enclosed flyer for the Waupaca Regional Recycling & Composting Center for recycling specifics and information on their cost-effective pay-per-bag garbage program. Please note that you can now recycle a wide variety of plastics, much more than you could before! So please take a moment to look at the enclosed flyer. Questions? Other informational tid-bits:

Unwanted Medications. Permanent medication collection boxes for the disposal of unwanted prescription and over-the-counter medications, including pet medications, are available year-round at the Clintonville, New London, Weyauwega Police Departments, and the Waupaca County Sheriff Department. You can now dump your pills into a ziploc bag for disposal. The empty bottles can be recycled. Please place liquid medication bottles in a sealed clear plastic bag.

- **Sharps/Needles/Lancets.** Riverside Medical Center accepts used sharps and provides collection containers at no cost. Call 715-258-1000 for additional information.
- **TVs, Computers, Printers, Copiers; Cellphones, VCRs, DVRs, DVD players, and other similar electronics** are banned from landfills and can be recycled at the Waupaca County PTF, E4981 Swan Rd., Manawa. Cost: \$0.25 per pound for residential electronics and \$0.30 per pound for commercial-generated electronics. Electronics must remain intact. Disassembled electronics will cost \$0.50 per pound.
- **Green Tips for the Holiday Season!** Avoid the gift-wrap trap! Reduce waste and save money with these gift-wrap alternatives:
 - Scarves, handkerchiefs, or bandanas
 - Old posters, maps, or sheet music
 - Newspapers, Sunday comic pages
 - Wallpaper scraps; fabric scraps
 - Home-sewn cloth bags
 - Fabric scraps (especially for the quilters on the list)
 - A present in a present (a hat in a matching scarf; cookies in a reusable tin or jar; kitchen gifts in towels; barbecue utensils in a tablecloth)
 - Reusable decorative bags
 - Cake pan, basket, wooden box
- **Green Gift Ideas for the Holiday Season!**
 - Season tickets to a sporting event
 - Membership to a museum or non-profit organization
 - Theater tickets
 - Refillable pens
 - Stainless steel coffee mug or water bottle
 - Compost bin
 - Cloth napkins, along with a gourmet dinner
 - Reusable razor

The Town of Farmington is also a party of 5 municipalities that support the Recycling Center in Waupaca. It was voted at their Recycling Compost Commission to use reserves to cover expenses for next year. **REMINDER:** We are a 'point of sale' location for the **orange trash tags**. Cost for tags: \$3.00 for one; \$15.00 for a sheet of five.

Avoid Carbon Monoxide Problems with Winter ... by Eric Halverson, Deputy Director Waupaca County Emergency Management.

The fall and winter heating season is just around the corner. With that brings the potential to encounter carbon monoxide (CO) in our homes. A few simple precautions can prevent a very serious and deadly accident from occurring. Carbon monoxide is colorless and odorless. CO is also only slightly lighter than air, so it may be found anywhere in your house.

Take a few minutes to review these preventive measures:

- Make sure appliances are installed and operated properly. Most appliances should be installed by qualified professionals.
- Have the heating system professionally inspected and serviced annually to ensure proper operation. The inspector should also check chimneys and flues.
- Never operate a portable generator or any other gasoline engine-powered tool either in or near an enclosed space such as a garage, house, or other building.
- Install a CO alarm that meets the requirements of the current UL 2034 safety standard.
- Never use portable fuel-burning camping equipment inside a home, garage, vehicle or tent unless it is specifically designed for use in an enclosed space.
- Never burn charcoal inside a home, garage, vehicle, or tent.
- Never leave a car running in an attached garage even with the garage door open.
- Never use gas appliances such as ranges, ovens, or clothes dryers to heat your home.
- Do not cover the bottom of natural gas or propane ovens with aluminum foil. Doing so blocks the combustion air flow through the appliance and can produce CO.

If you think that you have a carbon monoxide problem, LEAVE YOUR HOME IMMEDIATELY. If you need immediate medical assistance, call 911. Make sure everyone is out of the house. Contact your heating or appliance service person to make sure that your fuel-burning equipment is repaired and functioning properly.

Many CO detectors have batteries that need to be replaced every year. Change them when you check and change batteries in your smoke alarms. Also keep in mind that CO detectors have a life of usually only 5 to 7 years. If you don't know how old it is, get a new one.

A new radio station is on the air serving Waupaca and surrounding areas including Farmington. Waupaca Radio FM 96.3 is a low power FM radio station operated by the City of Waupaca and co-located with our cable access TV station Win-TV. Waupaca radio FM 96.3 was put on the air as an effort to expand our community media programming and to reach a larger population. Waupaca Radio is free to access and unlike Win-TV does not require cable TV or an internet subscription to access. Waupaca Radio's mission is to "connect the citizens of the Waupaca area with the activities of their government and community."

Programming you will hear on Waupaca Radio FM 96.3 includes audio of various government meetings; community speakers; non-profit/community groups; student programming and a wide variety of music. Waupaca Radio is here as a resource for any community group; non-profit organizations; school and government agency to utilize to promote upcoming events, produce short education/informational segments, airing of government meetings and more.

ATV notice: ATV's are permitted on the trail when the temperature is 28°F or colder. Snowmobile trails must be opened for a period of one week before ATV's are allowed on the trail in order to allow sufficient time to establish a base.

The Chain O'Lakes becomes busy during the winter with ice fishermen, walkers and cross country skiers. Snowmobilers and other vehicular drivers, **PLEASE** observe safety conditions and keep your distance.

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Farmington township is home to the Waupaca segment of the **Ice Age Trail** which starts within Hartman Creek State Park, running north of the park to Indian Valley Road and south to the park through the Emmons Creek Fish Hatchery and Wildlife Area. The segment is part of the 1,000 mile National Scenic Ice Age Hiking and Skiing Trail. The trail is for **hiking, snow-shoeing and cross-country skiing – no biking**. The Ice Age Trail is closed during deer gun season. Maps are available at the Waupaca County Parks & Recreation Dept in the courthouse. 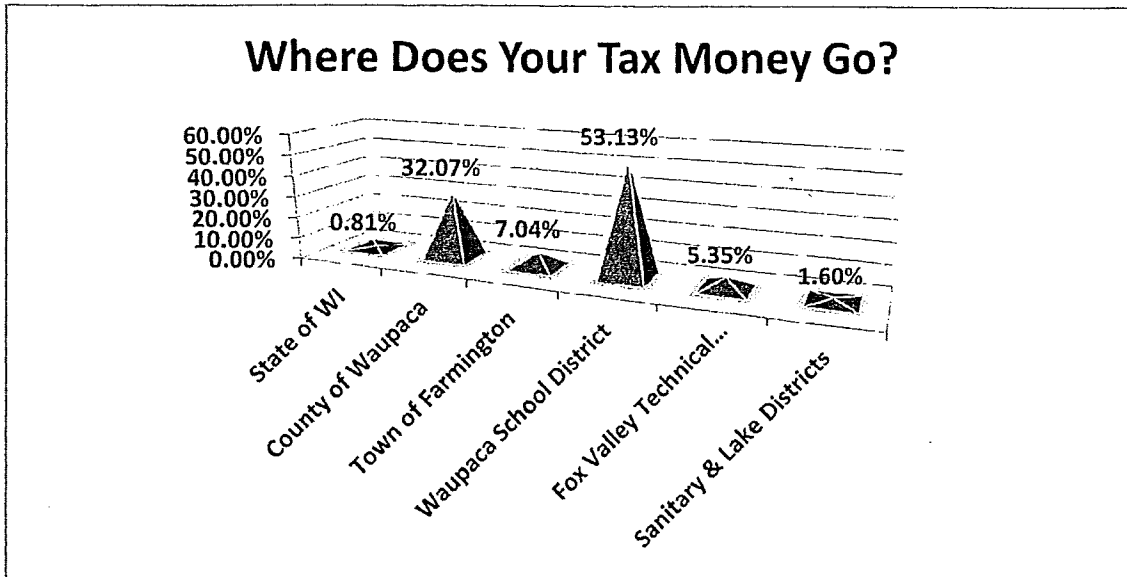
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Fall and Winter.....poem by Walterrean Salley
