Open Book/Board of Review

Each year residents are given the opportunity to meet at the Town Hall with the assessor during **Open Book** to discuss their current property assessments. If you choose after that meeting to appear before the **Board of Review** to contest your assessment, you will need to submit the necessary objection form in advance and receive an assigned appearance time from the Town Clerk,. The burden of proof lies with the property holder to provide their case for change in assessment. **Open Book and Board of Review are held at the Town Hall. Specific dates are published in the Waupaca County Post and on the Town website:** www.farmington-waupaca.com

Operator licenses for bartenders are valid July 1st thru June 30th of the following year and renewable for \$20.00 Any person not already holding a license in the Town of Farmington will need to have proof of completion of the **Responsible Beverage**Service Course when making application, Please contact Danielle Taggart, Town Clerk at 715-258-2779 or stop at the Town Hall.

PLEASE check your plant growth around your **fire number** that would interfere with the number being visible. You are responsible for removal of any overgrown branches/weeds that would cover the numbers. Fire numbers are required by law. If a post has been damaged, contact the Town Hall 715-258-2779.

The Farmington Town Hall is a "point-of-sale" location for the orange trash tags used with the "Pay-By-The-Bag" garbage service by the Recycling Center at 602 Parkside Pkwy (Cty Rd K). Tags are available in sheets of 5 at a cost of \$15.00 per sheet or \$3.00 for one tag.

Outage Safety and Preparation......East Central Electric Cooperative resource

Severe storms, unfortunately, do happen and are devastating to homes, properties, and lives. These storms can also t take down power lines - creating a dangerous situation for all . How long it takes to get your power restored depends on the extent of the storm's destruction, the number of outages, and when it becomes safe for utility personnel to get to the damaged areas. There are many steps in the assessment and restoration process - clearing downed power lines; ensuring public health and safety facilities are operational; checking power stations and transformers; repairing transmission lines, substations, and distribution lines; and getting power restored to members within the various damaged areas.

Please follow these safety precautions:

- Just because power lines are damaged does not mean they are dead. Every downed power line is potentially energized and dangerous until crews arrive on the scene to ensure power has been cut off. Downed power lines, stray wires, and debris in contact with them all have the potential to deliver a fatal shock. Stay far away and keep others away from downed power lines.

- Never enter a flooded basement if electrical outlets are submerged. The water could be energized.

- Do not turn power off if you must stand in water to do so. Call the service and have them turn off power at the meter.

- Do not use water-damaged electronics before properly restoring them. Electric motors in appliances should be cleaned and reconditioned before us. It may be necessary to replace some of your appliances and electronics. Have your water-damaged items inspected and approved by a professional before using them.

- If you clean-up outdoors after a storm, do not use electronic equipment when it wet out.

- If you are driving and come along a downed power line, stay away and keep others away. Contact emergency personnel to report a downed power line.

- If you do come in contact with a downed power line, do not leave the car. Wait for utility and emergency professionals to make sure the power line is de-energized before exiting the car.

Protect Your Home from Flooding...... Eric Halverson, Deputy Director Waupaca Cty Emergency Management

Recent years have brought near record water levels to the state. Areas that normally do not hold water have become a problem. The lowland and marsh areas that take the spring runoff are full going into early 2020.

The spring of 2019 presented high water and flooding in locations that are not prone to typical flooding. A quick warm-up caused ponding and some residential flooding that was not in a flood hazard zone. So who is at risk? Anyone can be. There are some steps that can be taken to reduce the risk of flood damage:

- 1) Take a look around the outside of your home. Are your gutters and downspouts clean? Do they drain away from the foundation? Are your basement window wells covered? Does your sump pump discharge far enough away from the foundation? Is it clogged or frozen?
- 2) Check your basement next. Move items from the floor. Elevate your water heater, furnace and other appliances if possible. Check your sump pump to be sure it is operating properly. If your sump pump runs often, you may want to have a spare on hand.
- 3) Consider flood insurance. Most homeowner's policies do not cover "flood" damage. Separate flood and sewer back-up policies may need to be purchased. The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) is a flood insurance policy offered through FEMA. It is available to homeowners as well as renters. It can cover losses to structures and personal property depending on the coverage that you chose. NFIP flood insurance is sold through many local insurance agents. If you are unsure of where to begin, or would like more information, we strongly recommend talking to your insurance provider about your coverage options. Please be aware the NFIP requires a 30-day waiting period for flood policies, unless it is required for a loan closing. So, the sooner you start the conversation, the better.

ATV/UTV Travel Routes were approved for all Town roads. These are NOT trails marked on public or private property. They are on the roadway portion of a road. Also GOLF CARTS are NOT allowed, only licensed ATVs/UTVs. Drivers must follow all State of Wisconsin ATV/UTV regulations.

Greater Waupaca Area Parks and Trails organization is asking if any citizen resident from the Town of Farmington is interested in being a member participant. Meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month at 10am at the Dayton Town Hall on State Rd 22. The organization main focus is to identify on and off road biking and walking routes, river routes, and parks both linear and neighborhood throughout the Townships of Dayton, Farmington, Lind, Waupaca and the City of Waupaca. - Recycle More & Pay Less for Garbage! The Waupaca Regional Recycling & Composting Center, 601 Lakeside Parkway in Waupaca offers a pay-by-the-bag garbage program that rewards you for recycling. The more you recycle, the less garbage you have and, therefore, the less money you have to pay for the disposal of that garbage. A WIN WIN situation! Stop at the site during hours of operation (Mon 12-6, Fri 7-4, Sat 7-3) for additional information, or visit www.waupacacountyrecycling.com. Large bulky items, such as furniture, carpet, and construction/demolition materials are not accepted at this site but are accepted at the Waupaca County PTF. Minimum charge of \$15 up to 360 pounds or \$80 per ton.
- PTF General Information. The Waupaca County Processing & Transfer Facility (PTF), located at E4981 Swan Road in the Town of Little Wolf, is open Mon Fri 7-3, Sat 7-noon (Mar Nov), 3rd Sat 7-noon (Dec Feb). Until further notice, the PTF will be open from 7-5 on the third Thursday of the month. All loads MUST be covered, secured, and scaled in 15 minutes prior to closing. Payment is cash or check only. PTF brochure is available online at www.waupacacountyrecycling.com.
- Compost Bins for Sale! The Home Composter ™ bin will be on display and available for purchase starting May 1 at the Waupaca County Solid Waste Department, 811 Harding Street, Waupaca, and at the Waupaca County PTF. Bin capacity is 128 gallons and comes with a locking lid, dual access doors, and a 'How To' handbook. Cost: \$55.00 includes tax.
- May Appliance Round-Up. During the first two weeks of May, residents can dispose of appliances at a reduced rate at the Waupaca County PTF. Freon appliances will cost \$10.00 per appliance, regularly \$15.00.
 Non-Freon appliances will cost \$8.00 per appliance, regularly \$10.00.
- Household Hazardous Waste. The Household Hazardous Waste program begins May 1st and runs through October at the Waupaca County PTF and is by APPOINTMENT ONLY. Call 715-258-6249 for an appointment to dispose of items such as old gas, paint thinner, varnish, oil paints, pesticides, and other poisonous or flammable substances.
- Outdoor Burning. Spring is wildfire season. In Wisconsin, most fires occur in April and May, after the snow is gone and before plants have greened up. Burning permits are required Jan. 1- May 31st. Permits can be obtained online at www.dnr.wi.gov (search keyword 'burn permit'), through the DNR Fire Warden Office at Hartman Creek State Park, or at the Waupaca County PTF. Burning of garbage, furniture, treated wood, construction debris, etc. is illegal and carries a hefty fine. Residential households can burn only leaves, brush, clean untreated wood and small amounts of confidential papers. Although burning permits are required through May 31st, the above burning restrictions apply year-round.
